**Accounting, Economics, and Management Students**

**NOTES FOR MANAGEMENT MAJORS:**

The requirements of the new management major are now in effect, with the exception of Senior Management Majors.

**SENIOR MANAGEMENT MAJORS:**

Students who are **senior** management majors during the 2008-2009 academic year can choose to complete the requirements of the old management major or of a transitional management major in consultation with their advisors.

**JUNIOR AND SOPHOMORE MANAGEMENT MAJORS:**

**Junior and Sophomore** management majors should plan on completing the new management major requirements.

**CURRENT AND FUTURE ACCOUNTING & MANAGEMENT MAJORS:**

It is recommended that both Acct 221 and Acct 222 be completed by students by the end their sophomore year. Neither of these classes have any prerequisites. Both are prerequisites for ALL upper level accounting and management classes.

**PROBLEM:** For some reason, in the past, students have been delaying taking these classes until their junior or senior year.

**SOLUTION:** Beginning in 2008, Acct 221 and Acct 222 will be offered BOTH fall and spring semesters. Acct 221 is also offered as an online course during the May and June terms. If one of these classes is closed, students should sign up for the other. If both are closed, they should follow directions to have their name added to the wait lists. The order in which students take Acct 221 and Acct 222 is no longer important.

**NOTE:** Please do not sign up for both Acct 221 and Acct 222 the same semester. There is limited space.

**NEW MANAGEMENT MAJOR**— The management major is foundational, integrated, relevant, personal, and challenging. It consists of 47-48 credits; see the following required courses, hours, and prerequisites below:

Courses in workplace writing and business computing are recommended. Courses in communication and additional coursework in the liberal arts are also recommended. Students are encouraged to take advantage of internship and other course experiences in Chicago, Philadelphia and around the world in study abroad programs.

**MGMT 222 (Management Perspectives and Theory)**

**MGMT 150 (Integrated Management Decisions), with a grade of C- or better, is a pre-requisite for MGMT 222. ECON 212 is a pre- or co-requisite for MGMT 222. No one will be admitted who has not met this requirement.**

**MGMT Upper-level Courses: Mgmt 222 is a pre-requisite for all upper-level Management courses (300-level and above). No one will be admitted to those classes without having previously completed this requirement.**

**MGMT 401 (Management Seminar): Senior Status is required for enrollment.**

**MGMT 390 (Internships in Vocation) will be offered FALL 2008.**  
Serves as an elective in the Management Major

**MGMT 391 (Internships and Seminars in Vocation) will be offered FALL 2008.**  
Substitutes for MGMT 401  
Senior status and Dept. Major required.

NOTE: Students cannot receive credit for both MGMT 390 and 391

**Management Minor:** is not allowed with an Accounting Major

**Accounting Minor:** is allowed with a Management Major

**ECON 211 & 212:** a grade of C- or higher in Econ 211 is required to enroll in Econ 212.

**ECON 311 (offered Spring term), 312 (offered Fall term) (INTERMEDIATE MACRO & MICRO):**  
Math 131 (calculus) is a pre-requisite.

**ECON 306 (Econometrics) will be offered FALL 2008.**  
Prerequisites: Econ 211, 212 and Statistics (Mathematics 210 or 311 & 312)

**ECON 318 (International Economics) will be offered FALL 2008.**

**ECON 395 (Financial Economics) will be offered FALL 2008.**

**ECON 401 (History of Economic Thought) will be offered SPRING 2008.**

**ECON 480: (Senior Project):** Prerequisites: ECON 306 (*Econometrics*), Econ 311, 312, and SENIOR STANDING

#### NOTE :

- **OFF-CAMPUS COURSES:**  
To receive credits towards the major for off-campus courses, the following form must be completed:  
"Application for Major/Minor Waiver/Substitution"
- **TRANSFER CREDITS**  
Transfer credit courses need to be 4 credits or an additional credit will be required.

#### **Philadelphia and Chicago Semester**

We strongly recommend that students participate in these off-campus programs which offer valuable internship opportunities. Internship credit may be applied to meet the Management major elective requirement. Other Management courses taken in these semesters may not be used as pairings, and, if taken, may limit pairing options upon return to campus.

Internships in Vocation will be offered May Term and will be offered also in the Fall Semester. Accounting Internships (Practicums) are offered during June Term and July Term.
