

Citation Guide: Literacy Learning Map – Part III

Please use the following directions as you cite sources in your Table of Contents:

For books:

Source (Where/How you found it), Author, Book title underlined, Publication date.

Example: HopeCat, Constance Weaver, Reading Process and Practice, 1994.

For journals, periodicals and ERIC documents:

Source (Where you found it. Do not list a search engine like “First Search.” Rather, list the database: Periodical Abstracts, ERIC, etc.), Author, Title of article in quotation marks, Name of journal/periodical in italics, Date of publication.

Example: ERIC, Tony Donk, “Reading in the year 2001”, *The Reading Teacher*, May, 2001.

For web Sites:

Source (Web), Name of Web Site (not address) and web site producer (NAEYC, etc.)

Example: Web, Reading Tips for Teachers and Parents, International Reading Association

Note: If you can not determine the web site name or producer, list them as “unknown”

For Interviews:

Person’s name, title, date of interview

Example: Lucy Calkins, Professor at Teacher’s College of New York, March 27, 2001

For videos:

The word “video” for the source, title (in quotation marks), producer, date of issue

Example: Video, “The Writing Workshop,” International Reading Association, 2000.

Final Note: Sometimes you may have found an article, book, etc. through another person (your mentor, a friend, etc. vs. ERIC, HopeCat, etc.) or just by looking through some shelves in a bookstore. In these cases, please list the source as: Personal Search.
