

SOCIAL STUDIES GROUP MAJOR FOR SECONDARY TEACHING

Updated August 2008

The Social Studies Group major for Secondary Certification consists of 38 hours selected from four areas of emphasis: Economics, Geography, History, and Political Science. These four areas are congruent with a State of Michigan Social Studies Standards and the Michigan Curriculum Framework, and with the test objectives to qualify for final certification to teach in Michigan. Candidates for certification in HIST major must pass the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification (MTTC) in Social Studies (Test #84). You must demonstrate your knowledge in the following categories:

In order to complete a Secondary Social Studies Group major:

You will need to take at least two courses in Economics (8 credits) and two courses in Geography (6 credits), at least 3 courses in History (12 credits), and two courses in Political Science (8 credits). You will choose at least two more courses in an area of interest/emphasis to bring total to at least 38 credits.
