

# LONDON MAY TERM UPDATE

Dear Alumni of the London May term,

Greetings from beautiful Holland. Looking at the construction cranes out my office window reminds me of our time in London. I can't recall any time in the past in which so much renovation and new building was occurring in downtown London. Even our modest lodgings at the Celtic Hotel underwent a significant overhaul. Bathrooms now reside in almost every room.

Once again, we had strong demand for our program, and once again it was difficult to limit the number of participants. We had a wonderful group of fifteen students that displayed the character traits of curiosity and humility that we look for in the selection process. We have become convinced that the best teachable moments, and perhaps the best moments overall, are the ones we share with our students while “breaking bread” together. We were privileged to have Professor Sarah Estelle co-lead the program this year. Sarah joined Hope three years ago and has been a very welcome addition to the department. This was her first time in London, and we were fortunate to have her husband Aaron join us as well. Sarah is very interested in economics and public policy and how these play out in different contexts and in different countries. She also suggested many new venues for our program, some of which may become

mainstays. One such venue was a tour and history of the Poppy Factory. The Poppy Factory employs disabled veterans to produce all the poppies that are used for memorial events and keepsakes. The workplace and workers were quite a contrast to the visit we had at the Royal Bank of

Scotland the previous day. It is precisely this type of exposure—the wide variety of places and opportunities one can work and serve—that drive the design of our program.

Another trend that has occurred over the last few years is the variety of experiences and locations that our students have ventured forth and “attacked” during their cultural exploration opportunities. This year’s production of *Les Mis*, and the wonderful seats we were able to obtain, piqued the theatrical interest of many of our students. *The Lion King*, *Billy Elliot*, *Matilda*, *Miss Saigon*, *Wicked*, *Jersey Boys*, *Woman in Black*, *War Horse*, and *The Strange Incident of the Dog in the Night* were all musicals or shows that were attended by more than one person in the group. This year also saw several groups on different occasions making their way to visit the town of Dover, the castle, and the white cliffs. Both Sarah Estelle and I made it there as well.
